YO, HUMANS!

-  You are liable for damage or injury inflicted by your dog(s) (SMC 18.12.080).
-  You must be in control of your dog(s) at all times (SMC 18.12.080).
-  You must muzzle dogs that exhibit dangerous or aggressive behavior; biting, fighting, and excessive barking are not allowed (SMC 9.25.024).
-  You must leash your dog when it is outside the off-leash area; you must carry a leash for each dog while you are inside the off-leash area (SMC 9.25.084 and 12.18.080).
-  You must clean up after your dog(s) and deposit feces in the containers at the site, and you must visibly carry scoop equipment (SMC 9.25.082 and 18.12.080).
-  You must closely supervise young children.
-  Bring food into off-leash areas at your own risk.
-  Leave bicycles outside off-leash area.
-  Unattended dogs are not allowed in off-leash areas.
-  Owners who see unattended dogs or other rule violations should call Animal Control at 206-386-7387, Extension 2.

Off-Leash Areas for Dogs



YO, DOGS!

Seattle Parks and Recreation welcomes you to explore and enjoy most parks (on a leash), and we offer nine exciting exceptions! At these designated off-leash areas, you are free to run, roll over, meet new friends, work out, play with your owners and socialize with your canine friends. **Please remember that you're not allowed, even with a leash, on beaches, in children's play areas, or on athletic fields.**

Ask your human to take you to:

GENESEE PARK.

46th Avenue S & S Genesee St. This is a fully fenced off-leash area with double gates, a doggie drinking fountain and a kiosk for community notices.

GOLDEN GARDENS PARK.

8498 Seaview Place NW, in Ballard. The off-leash area is in the upper park, and is fenced.

WOODLAND PARK.

You'll find the off-leash area west of the tennis courts on W Green Lake Way N. This site is sloped and has a doggie drinking fountain.

SAND POINT MAGNUSON PARK.

7400 Sand Point Way NE. This off-leash area is our largest, running along the

eastern and northern boundaries of the park, with some beach access in the northeast corner. There is funding in the 2000 Pro Parks Levy to make substantial improvements to this off-leash area.

WESTCREST PARK.

8806 8th Avenue SW in West Seattle. This site is now bigger and better than the original, and now is more than four acres in size.

I-90 "BLUE DOG POND."

You'll recognize Blue Dog Pond by the big sculpture of a blue dog. It's located at the northwest corner of the intersection of Martin Luther King Jr. Way S and S Massachusetts.

NORTHACRES PARK,

Located west of I-5 at N 130th Street. The park lies between N 130th and N 125th, and the off-leash area is in the northeast corner of the park. There is parking available on the west side of the park on 1st NE, and on the south side of the park on N 125th.

JOSE RIZAL PARK.

1008 - 12th Avenue S on North Beacon Hill. There is parking available on 12th S.

REGRADE PARK.

3rd and Bell Streets in downtown Seattle's Belltown. This small off-leash area is ideal for people and dogs who work and live downtown. It is open on a trial basis and Parks will evaluate it in 2005.





SEATTLE ANIMAL CONTROL

Officers are charged with providing a safe, healthy and caring environment where animals and people can co-exist. To carry out their mission, Animal Control staff help to educate dog owners and actively enforce Seattle's leash, scoop, and license laws. Officers patrol in Seattle parks to ensure the safe and appropriate use of both off-leash and on-leash areas.

Fines for off-leash, license and scooping violations range from \$50 to \$150, and can be \$500 at a beach.

Please obey the law! **GOOD DOG!!!**

YO, DOGS!

-  If you're female and you're in heat, you are not allowed in off-leash areas (SMC 9.25.084).
-  If you're a puppy younger than four months of age, you are not allowed in off-leash areas.
-  To come and play in off-leash areas, you need to be licensed and vaccinated (SMC 9.25.080 and 12.18.080).
-  If you wear a pinch or choke collar, ask your human to remove it when you come into off-leash areas.
